MR. MATERESE: Somebody accidentally met 1 (indiscernible) to salvage. 2 MR. POPE: Which we have to? 3 MR. MATERESE: Yeah, I know. I'm just trying to 4 5 highlight what I'm doing, you know. (Interposing) 6 7 FEMALE VOICE: I had wanted to see them because they're right there. You saw them. 8 9 FEMALE VOICE: Oh, I know. Me too. Did they 10 actually mean it? FEMALE VOICE: There's a lot of water down 11 12 there. 13 MR. MATERESE: All right. So did you ever get 14 to see these? Yeah. right. While we're waiting for 15 Marina, Lou, do you just want to make a quick explanation 16 of the problems they were just looking at? 17 MR. LOU CAFORIO: I believe that's the features of the new (inaudible), right? 18 19 MR. MALTERESE: Yes. 20 MR. CAFORIO: The one closest to -- yeah, I got 21 22

it. Well, that was our first time of putting it out onto
some pasture (sounds like) just based on the river levels.
So, I need the update. It falls for the other, it's like
it was abrupt. They decided to go really quick. There's
a lot to prepare (indiscernible) in order to move it
along. But the original time was to come in at 5:00

Christmas morning and start on the western end of the south lot (sounds like) closure. And then you got Dave (phonetic) who's supposed to be there, getting those off in place. Then we will go do our other work with people.

I don't know if it will happen at all.

Certainly not, it would be very hard if it rains. It continued to rain. So I left my house around 2:15 and just to spot check. I stopped and looked at the river forecast. We decided we're going to, I decided that we're to go over here. So I called Chad (phonetic) (indiscernible). I said bring him in and let's go. So by 4:30 they were probably already working at the south lot closure which is the west. Then they went over and they got this one off.

This one took about three hours roughly. First time it really bit (sounds like) for you. It's not bad. It's labor intensive, but they got out everything. It went well. We left that up maybe just the following morning.

So the river though it crested at points, it's going to happen. The water started to fill up. There's lots of (indiscernible) outside where that water is. That was under water. Our low lying areas in Endwell had water as well. But it did not get at the south lot closure itself for that one. We weren't going to take any chances. But based on what's going on, it wouldn't wise

1 (sounds like) to go back in the rain. With the forecast, well, not bad as the previous snow forecast. So we're 2 3 battling toward that. So we were very lucky, we were very fortunate we 4 5 didn't have -- we're not going to have severe flooding. But it went well. I lost track of time, but I think we 6 7 worked on Christmas Eve, on Christmas day. I think they probably did. They started in Endwell around 1:00 and 8 9 then just gotten off. They already did it before the snow. A lot of guys were dragging --10 11 (Interposing) 12 MR. CAFORIO: -- really happy with the turnout. 13 (Indiscernible). 14 MR. MATERESE: That's the rear end. 15 MR. CAFORIO: We've got a very good craftsman on 16 that too. 17 MR. MATERESE: Yeah. Right. MR. CAFORIO: So we made some modification, did 18 19 some welding right at the field to try it out, you know. 20 MR. MALTERESE: Made some changes. MR. CAFORIO: Everyone's thinking outside the 21 2.2 box (inaudible). Every one that helped out has got a 23 great and positive attitude. Very good. So, okay, that's 24 it on the weather for this year. 25 MR. MALTERESE: All right. So I guess, I bet you guys would be interested in the efficiency and the 26

oh, I'm sorry, I interrupted. Over here, could you tell them that you guys drove over past (indiscernible)?

MR. CAFORIO: No. But there have an understanding that we had — there's just one piece of this wall that gave us a lot of issues when we were putting it back, so that you could drive over it. We didn't have an appropriate tool to work with this. They just wanted a screw (sounds like).

That was what they started doing. They started welding and fabricating based on the capability of the automatic driver and then of course technology stuff.

They got a rhythm. So the last 20 of them, they really were not properly fashioned. They had different parts.

So it was just good. And with the guys, of course, there was just a lot of camaraderie with all those guys. So once they got that they would put it out, you know, whatever it is they would churn them off. It's nice to see that they got it. They figured it out and hammered it out so. Again, just a great response from everybody. The Sewer Department, those guys worked -- I think the first two guys worked 36 hours straight before they got relieved.

So they, everyone thereafter they're there as well, were working around the clock from start to finish.

Actually, the highway people finished up last. It's the pumps. So that's when they could go home and get some

rest because they've been working way too long. 1 highway guys covered the sewer and vice versa. So it's 2 working pretty good. 3 MR. MATERESE: Thank you, Lou. 4 MR. CAFORIO: You're welcome. 5 6 MR. MATERESE: Okay. Let's get to the town 7 changing zoning (inaudible). So ladies? MS. SARA ZUBALSKY-PEER: So basically Julio 8 9 (phonetic) transmitted the things on his end. Good morning, Dan (phonetic). 10 11 MALE VOICE: Good morning. 12 MR. MATERESE: Excuse me, Sara. I'm sorry. 13 you move up a little bit to the mic, please? Thank you, 14 Sara. 15 MS. ZUBALSKY-PEER: No problem. All right. Julio submitted rezoning applications moving up. 16 17 are (indiscernible) on the main highway beside 18 (indiscernible). It's an all commercial and residential. He wants the zoning changed throughout residential because 19 20 he wants some chickens and eventually, of course, organic

21 animals. We've been going back and forth internally about 2.2 if this is appropriate or not. It's not helping to spot 23 the building because the carousel is behind him. Far 24 right is residential, but it's fairly low very much 25 they'll spot the building along lots up into general 26 commercial.

We went back, Marina and I, to look at how the west side is split zoning. This side used to be. For a number of reasons, they're in the last comprehensive plan that they changed it all to commercial. So we've just been kind of going back and forth internally about the right way to move forward with this. I don't know if Marina wants to add on this. She spoke with Julio directly. She'd be working with him pretty closely.

MS. MARINA LANE: So let me just jump in quickly and let the board members know that you've got a series of different zoning maps there. So first I have -- well, first, you can see the map where he drew in where he would like his chicken enclosure. But then the next map shows that existing zoning as of 2011. The next map shows what the zoning would look like as he applied for. Then the next map shows an alternate pattern of zoning which is similar to what is on the very last page, what the zoning used to be prior to when the Town went through the entire unified zoning ordinance and passed a whole new zoning code in 2011. So there are some issues. And I believe Dee is there with you today. I really can't see her.

MALE VOICE: She's here.

MS. LANE: So Dee can explain her concerns, which Alan echoed, about the split zoning which is how to enforce split zoning without -- you know, code enforcement can't take the time and doesn't have the right to enter

properties to ensure that certain activities are being carried out. But, as Sara was saying, on the west side of the road there is split zoning. Meaning parcels are zoned for the first on average about 300 feet as the commercial zoning, and then to the rear as rural residential which used to be agricultural.

MR. MATERESE: Okay. Dee, you're up.

MS. DARIA GOLAZESKI: So the reason we looked at the east side, the reason of rezoning, before going to the creek, it's because we have probably north and south (inaudible). Without them there's the floodplain and the floodway along the creek. Other uses of the long (indiscernible) were encroaching into the old ag district split zone. So for consistency we said, since the last time we worked for the most part into the creek, it makes sense.

On the west side, some of those lots are pretty big long lots that touch into the residential district.

So we left that one alone because there's also a hill there which is kind of the natural bearing.

The code doesn't mention sport zones, but some codes do. So we don't have language that talks about it. In some zoning codes we can encroach on the less restricted. This is the more restricted, in this case you could encroach the use of the commercial into the rural residential and the old ag.

I have no preference either way. I'm just explaining there would be other restrictions that we have to worry about because, depending on what he does, not playing nice, if they ever redo the floodplain maps, a lot of the property would be going to the floodplain. So it's whatever you desire. I won't be here to worry about it.

MR. MATERESE: Thank you, Dee. Alan, do you want to speak on that?

MR. POPE: If I could just echo what Sara said on the comprehensive plan. So this is the map that concerns me the most. So here you got commercial on both sides. It is well thought out, I think, and implemented. Now the proposal from this particular resident is to rezone something right in the middle of it.

We looked long on that. To me, that looks a lot like bad zoning. So what I said the other day on the call was this is not a rezone. It's not whether you like chickens or dogs. It's not whether you think this is a nice guy or not a nice guy. It's not really where he says he's going to put his chickens, or his cows, or his horses. It's really a rezoning issue.

So this is subject to challenge. I think it would be. You can't really say, well, I don't know if anybody is going to challenge it, let's take the risk because we are also looking to the future. What happens when the next guy comes along and wants to do something

but he's not a nice person? It's not about chickens that

everybody loves. Well, almost everybody. Then what do

you do? You kind of set a precedence at least in this

4 corridor (sounds like). So that's my legal concern.

Think of it without regarding whether it's chickens.

Think of it without regarding whether you like this guy or even the other gentleman that came in with his nice dog.

That's not how we should look at resolving this.

MR. MATERESE: Okay.

MS. LANE: And I agree with Alan in that.

That's the main reason that I didn't just simply submit it to you as an application. I really wanted everybody to have time to think about it and decide whether you think

it's a good idea to even accept the application to rezone.

3	act on tonight. It is one that I will explain to you.
4	You guys will have time to think about it, to understand
5	it, what you thought of it. Is everybody good with that?
6	MALE VOICE: Yeah.

9	property?

MS. GOLAZESKI: Depending on where on the property he's proposing to do anything. It will depend on whether or not there is an extra layer of approvals, whether it's zoned the way it is now or changed. It has to go through a floodplain development. That's important.

MS. GOLAZESKI: Commercial properties require some kind of approval or a special permit depending on the A rural residential depends on the use whether or not it's a special permit or not.

FEMALE VOICE: Okay.

MALE VOICE: Okay. It's to be done by such a permit?

MS. GOLAZESKI: Not in a general commercial zone unless you totally want to really like rewrite where

1 animal husbandry and chickens are permitted.

MALE VOICE: Does it have to be general?

MS. GOLAZESKI: Well, you could do it in a couple of different ways. You could say they're allowed in any zone with a special permit or with certain guidelines, certain sized lots, single-family owner-occupied only house. You could put a lot of restrictions on it. I have a file about most of this. It's about this stuff. Just assuming they're under a code a few years ago to allow for a special permit on this kind of suburban lot, owner-occupied no more than four chickens and no roosters. Certain limits for the pens, certain limits for the work to be on the lot. And it backfired and they repealed the law. I have it though if you want to look at it or discuss it. Somehow I need a code because we could have a problem with chickens.

MS. LANE: Dee, what was the last thing you said?

MS. GOLAZESKI: I have the old Johnson City code. I have a very thick file on chicken laws that I researched several years. If you want to look at it, if you want to look it, make some kind of amendment. But we may have problems with chickens. One lady tried to say they were emotional support animals. On a lot on Wayne Street, she tried to get a use variance because it's not a permitted use. It's a single-family zoning district and

1	she was denied. Then they get loose. They go around the
2	neighborhood. They stop traffic. They come barring the
3	road.
4	MS. ZUBALSKY-PEER: My chickens never fly in the
5	road.
6	MS. GOLAZESKI: Okay. Most of your chickens are
7	roosters and you live on some (indiscernible). It's
8	different when you're talking about a small residential
9	lot.
10	MS. ZUBALSKY-PEER: Yeah. You're right.
11	MS. LANE: I think we have to wait until Dee
12	retires, Sara.
13	MR. MATERESE: All right. So why don't we mull
14	this over and then we can bring it up again in the next
15	session. You might think it's something you want to
16	entertain or not. Is that okay with everybody?
17	FEMALE VOICE: Yeah. Okay with me.
18	MS. LANE: Yeah. There is no rush.
19	MR. MATERESE: All right. Thank you.
20	FEMALE VOICE: Thank you.
21	MR. MATERESE: Marina, do you want make mention
22	of the GlidePath before we move on?
23	MS. LANE: I'm sorry. I couldn't understand
24	you.
25	MR. MATERESE: Do you want to quickly mention
26	about GlidePath before we move on?

MS. LANE: Well, I will tell you a couple of things. You've already seen their presentation. I left one full-sized plan on the table. Where? I think in the corner by the water cooler. If you would like, I can send it to you by email. In some of the things, the details are so small, you have to expand it on your computer screen to really read anything. But I think that it -- I was going to confirm with Dee, so Dee, you could answer now, that this would be a public utility facility. Right, Dee?

MS. GOLAZESKI: That's correct.

MS. LANE: And those are permitted in any zoning district. I mean it does serve a very useful purpose, as I'm sure you're all aware, of stabilizing the grid. the electric grid. And I will say that the firm that they hired for doing the environmental review appears to have done a very, very thorough job. They have been very willing to work with us on the different things that we've requested that either they change or add. In addition, Erin Hazen, who made her presentation to you previously, does plan to attend the meeting tonight via Zoom - she could be there - in case anybody has any questions.

What I'm going to do today and didn't have a chance is to let you know a rough schedule. If you can accept that application today and then I could forward it to the County tomorrow, that will give the 30-day review

period before the Planning Board makes their recommendation to you on whether to accept the preliminary PUD plan. In my memo to you, you'll see that I explained that the Planning Board will be voiding the PUD that was approved in September at Homestead Village PUD Development Plan because CSI, which triggered that whole process we went through in the fall, decided not to build on 16 Beech Street. So we must waive that PUD that was approved. would go through the same process now for this development.

My expectations are that, in the first meeting in February, you could call for a public hearing to be held at the second meeting in February at which time the Planning Board will have already met and be able to provide their recommendation. The County will have completed their review and then you could either vote at that second February meeting or you could hold it over, if you felt you needed to, into the first March meeting. Then the Planning Board could potentially do a site plan review at their meeting in March, which is the second Tuesday of March.

MR. MATERESE: I'm good with that. Is everybody else okay with that or does anyone have a concern?

MR. THOMAS AUGOSTINI: Last time we had talked about projects just similar to a CSI.

MR. MATERESE: Right.

1	MR. AUGOSTINI: They come in. They go through
2	the process and then they don't follow through with their

MR. POPE: Their application is already in. I think they got a pretty argument that, you know, they (interposing) the law based upon when they filed the application.

FEMALE VOICE: I think that was what he was referring to.

1	So Ray, so I asked him to go out and get quotes
2	to replace it exactly with what's there. So that involves
3	a crane. It involves taking it down and placing a brand
4	new net (sounds like) there. Then that, throughout the
5	(indiscernible), I didn't see this yet. So first of all
6	you don't need to act on this.
7	MR. MATERESE: No. No. I just wanted to inform
8	the board. I don't want to keep this, hiding it from the
9	board.

MR. CAFORIO: No, no, no. But I would assume it's essential to have that discussion.

MR. MATERESE: That's what it is. And there are several --

MR. CAFORIO: At least we talked, I don't know what it says on there relative to Endwell (phonetic). So we have a portable big one, a very large 300,000 feet portable unit. You can use it in the Rec Center and in the gym so you don't need a sprinkler system or anything like that. So it's not usable to residents right now. But I'll run ahead (inaudible).

MR. MATERESE: And this new unit will have nothing to do with the air-conditioning unit that they were talking about before. This is just to keep it cool.

MR. CAFORIO: Yeah. I don't know how we'd do what he's asking. It's within the procuring cost guidelines. I spoke with Laura several weeks ago when

1 I first met with (inaudible). It looked like this was going to go south quickly. And there's a couple of 2 different options to pay for that repair. But it 3 wouldn't be probably allowed (sounds like). 4 5 MR. AUGOSTINI: No. I mean like how do you not know when to go with it? 6 7 MR. CAFORIO: I don't know. I haven't seen

that law.

MR. AUGOSTINI: So you'll cover (sounds like) it?

MR. CAFORIO: Yeah. I don't know what --I don't -- I'm not sure what (inaudible) yeah.

MR. POPE: Can I just raise -- I was going to raise that same issue. It has to be -- I don't know, maybe even ten years ago, I'm not sure you even knew it all before. But I proposed, you know, a local law that will allow you to pick the best value. So not necessarily the lowest price but the best value makes the plan (sounds like), you know, being local merchants, you know, time, response time to repair, things of that nature.

And then the Board back then decided not to do that. They didn't think that was a good idea. And I remember they had some legitimate reasons, you know, because it does allow some gray area to creep in that way. So it could allow for people to litigate over

whether that's the right thing as opposed to black and 1 white as to where it was going. 2 So they might do something on the third day, 3 that we want to bring it back to the Board saying is 4 it worthwhile looking at changing the law to be best 5 6 value so you have some flexibility to look at 7 something than downgrade it (sounds like). 8 MR. MATERESE: Okay. Any other questions 9 about that? 10 MR. CAFORIO: You've a point, Alan. You've a 11 point. MR. MATERESE: We can talk about that. 12 13 MR. CAFORIO: A low bid is always not the 14 best bid. 15 MR. MATERESE: Right. 16 MR. CAFORIO: Right? And a lot of times, 17 you want to average your dollars. Just to give an 18 example, contactor A comes back in the past two years with a the low bid. The second year they've got a 19 20 project. Then the third year, with a low bid again. 21 They had nothing but issues for the prior two years. 22 It's not in our best interest to award them again if 23 you go through those problems. And that was part of 24 You can read these posts, you know --25 MALE VOICE: Right. 26

MR. CAFORIO: -- based on their past poor

performance, et cetera, too. And there's a lot better than that, we get offers. And some of the contractors that even work with us maybe even once every couple of years, you get to know these people. And you develop a relationship with other people that they're either spot on and you don't have to worry about them or you got guys who got the last 20 percent, you know. So, a lot is to be said sometimes for that for a reputable person that's doing the work that you talk to instead of \$400,000.

MR. AUGOSTINI: And I would agree with that if you have a history around issues. You know, on this memo, there's no history of issues.

MR. CAFORIO: Yeah. And again, I apologize,
I did not see that memo before. I just saw it
upstairs right now.

MR. MATERESE: Okay. Thanks, though. Again, that's something we can bring up at the next meeting, find out what's going on. Okay. So, two more issues. I think you guys are hanging around tomorrow. One issue that's like -- okay, so, just you know, the elevator has not been functioning. Lou is in the process of trying to -- what he's described (audio glitch).

MR. CAFORIO: (Indiscernible) got some properties having another company (inaudible) one of

those things because there's a specific circuit board, they say a relay, that they cannot obtain. That relay controlled the doors opening and closing. So after having spoken with these guys again, and in my certain thinking (sounds like) that they're saying that absolutely, I cannot believe you can't process a relay to a different vendor or something else that have a relay that will operate these doors.

So, they haven't had the vessel along with the elevator company that's been here. Also, we're soliciting another opinion on that specific relay and see if that relay is available or not. If you look at it, you know, physically look at it, it doesn't look like anything off of a spaceship or anything. It was a very generic contact relay. So I don't know.

Dan is working with getting that other company to come in here and assess this and see if they can come up with a relay or someone else to look at the doors if they're properly on (sounds like).

MR. MATERESE: So we're giving them an opportunity try to get this thing fixed as rapidly as possible. Other way, the cost of replacement is going to be \$150,000.

MR. CAFORIO: All right. You know, between \$130,00 to 150,000.

MR. MATERESE: And it will take six months

MR. MATERESE: So, we're trying to see we're just trying to see if we can pick the breakdown. Then we can investigate, depending on what this new company says also what the status of the elevator is. Is that fair to say?

FEMALE VOICE: How old is the elevator? MR. CAFORIO: We got to assume that the original permit to run date of that elevator is still the same. It's going to be a long time. I couldn't tell you exactly what year it is. But it's not current by any means. I got to tell you it's probably 30 to 40 years old. Okay?

MR. CAFORIO: But one thing I can say, though, is, you know, some people had concerns because sometimes the elevator stopped working like when you're in it. That's nothing to worry about because I got stuck in here last weekend on a Saturday morning, I got stuck in the elevator. Because chat distracted me. When I came in and I took a phone call, I got in the elevator. And as I pushed the button, I'm like, Jesus, it's not a good idea being here by myself.

It was freaking long. And there I sat till they had to come rescue me and lower them in to get me

out of this. I wasn't nervous or anything. But things started going through your head. Like, it's just when the elevator shaft is on fire and I'm stuck in the car and I can't get out, you know. Crazy stuff like that. But I'm hoping that the (indiscernible) Company at least can give us their opinion.

MR. MATERESE: Right.

MR. CAFORIO: Again, I understand that the company's working on it. I understand their position as well. So, if we can't get out there (indiscernible) it looks like they're alerting us that the board will somehow have to find a way to finance a new elevator and we'll have to hire this (inaudible). I don't think Sara would ever be able to come up with any help. Right, Sara? I know you have to stop yourself in the past for elevator projects.

MS. ZUBALSKY-PEER: Yeah. It's a super messy process with how long we're dealing with this, the general conduct development. They do have a clause that allows for ADA access but it's (audio glitch) to the age of the building. But they can understand the elevator, the maintenance thing, check on if it can be repaired not for replacement. Then they also brought the whole issue then again justifying because it is not only used by people with disabilities. It's used by, you know, people. We can't be strict.

So, I'm still going back and forth. But I don't think there's going to be any help. I don't think they have developed the tool. Everything.

First, there's no funds for (indiscernible) and development. But I don't think something will even be (inaudible).

Okay. So again, keeping you MR. MATARESE: up to date. All right, next issue, opening the building or reopening the building. We directed Dan Schofield to try to see and come up with a plan. Не came up with a plan to furnish, install three storefront handles. This is to replace the existing one exterior and two interior doors. Each were 42inch. So, everything was in the end acceptable. They had automatic openers and so on. And then the interior hallway with the sidelight and trim, ten electronic, electric spring and standard door closer, and then some other costs. That plan is a \$17,808. To me, that's kind of a lot. I don't know that we need to do that. But that's, again, it's up to the Board to decide whether to spend that big money.

However, I did inform staff today that we would be discussing reopening the building today. I placed in front of you responses that I got back from staff. I hope you got a chance to look at it. If not, please look at it now. And then we can discuss

it. Then I'm guessing that's where you're staying (sounds like) so -- okay. So, just give them a chance to read what you guys wrote. And then we should (inaudible). So, we can check those signatures.

MR. AUGOSTINI: So, which one is it? Are people standing outside or they're not standing outside? Because there's two different statements here.

MR. MATERESE: That's a good question.

MR. AUGOSTINI: And my only point to the response to Gretchen was these people are outside waiting for lengths of time. That's an issue.

MR. MATERESE: Right. That's the issue. I talked about that before.

FEMALE VOICE: I responded to two people.

One lady, was just standing staring at the door. And

I came up and said can I help you? She goes, "What am

I supposed to do? I don't have a cell phone. I've

been standing here." I said, well, what do you need?

And she said (inaudible). And I said, "You have to

wait outside, you have to come out first." I don't

know if she waited. I think she walked away.

Another one was an elderly gentleman. He had paperwork for the Assessor's Office. And it was a really cold day. And he had been banging at the door, nobody answered. I went down. And he was so cold, he

was shaking. And again, I took the paperwork I had to make copies of, you know, one of their (indiscernible).

MR. CAFORIO: So, I've mentioned it about million times, that the current system does not work. Lenny's camera system is temperamental at best. When he's not there, if no one else is there, there's nobody coming. That is not a good system for us. Something moderate (sounds like), something like a central stage or something, where they are there all the time, I could say, yeah, that could probably work.

But you can't depend on Lenny to be there at 8:00 in the morning until 4:00 or in his office. The personnel in that office could be constantly out of here that they couldn't respond to the people waiting. They have no ways to communicate. And I don't know what the solution is. You know, we thought that was a solution. And it's really not a good solution.

MR. LEONARD PERFETTI: Part of the problem is that camera system sometimes work with frequent (sounds like) flaws. It is delayed. It's so bad, it's delayed 1 to 30 seconds. When we finally answered the door - somebody pushed the button - they'd probably walk away because nobody answered them. So I don't know if I have to use the Internet or how it works. Sometimes it works and sometimes it

PROCEEDING 1 doesn't. But if it works properly, if I had that from my computer, anybody in the office would hear the 2 3 doorbell. And they could answer. MR. MATERESE: Let me ask this. Well, it 4 5 only seems to be a couple of people. Wouldn't it be faster to let them in the front door and put a latch 6 7 in the vestibule door? There's a button there, so they're not out in the cold? 8 9 FEMALE VOICE: (Interposing) They walk into the vestibule? 10 11 MR. MATERESE: Right. But that's a large 12 vestibule. But ours is a smaller one. But wouldn't 13 that work? Couldn't that work?

MR. CAFORIO: I'm just kind of saying that what we're doing now doesn't work. And we tried to look at alternatives and that was \$17,000 to totally redesign it, bringing people in to the different areas and being able to access. I don't want to use the word chain (inaudible). They have the whole area, they have enough room to social distance, I think, in or out, whatever they needed, but we were looking at that option. But it's taking much, much higher than we thought. But we had to reconfigure the doors to be

1 ADA compliant (interposing). MR. MATERESE: Right. 2 MR. CAFORIO: That's, you know, a random 3 option, but, we couldn't do it any other way. 4 MR. MATERESE: So, not offering enough 5 6 (sounds like). CAFORIO: Well, that system is not 10 horrible (sounds like). We got to reconfigure it had 11 12 the double camera units on this. It's kind of 13 hardwired and fixed to the building. 14 MR. Somebody will push the button so they can ask, what will I do. Unless the speaker's on, it's not going to be possible. It's not a two-way phone, you know.

MR. CAFORIO: So again, the original tech behind the camera system was so that this board, people could be in here. And somebody could come to the door. It wasn't designed for what we're doing.

MR. CAFORIO: So if we leave them alone, the only other thing is that there's going to have to be an attendant to the door every time the doorbell rings. Okay. All right?

MR. MATERESE: How does that sound to you, ladies?

MS. ZUBALSKY-PEER: I mean, I'll have to wait, but I think right now I'll just look around how we're ready though. But added to that, it's affected me to feel like there isn't enough communication. So then when I sometimes I'm getting less (sounds like), I try to communicate with other staff. I try talking, hey, I'm part of the meeting. But I do feel like what they said, a lot of times we'll hear about things walking through hallway. Everyone is being involved in the decision making process, saying, hey, this is going to affect how your department is run, let's talk about the best possible solution.

Sometimes, we create mountains out of molehills and we won't need to figure elaborate solutions that if we just sit and talk like all departments, all of us working on as a management team for the Town discussing and

communicating, then we could face them a lot quicker where they can call (sounds like) me on huge issues that we'll already get so emotional to help. But that we need to be a part of this. All this is happening. We're hearing all this is going to happen.
