TOWN OF UNION BOARD MEETING

April 21, 2021

The Regular Meeting of the Town Board of Town of Union was held on Wednesday, April 21, 2021 at 7:00 P.M. in the Town Board Room, 3111 East Main Street, Endwell, New York and via Zoom. A full transcript of this meeting will be available on the Town website at a later date.

Also in attendance were Village of Johnson City Mayor Greg Deemie, Village of Endicott Mayor Linda Jackson, and former Broome County Legislator George Phillips.

Supervisor Richard A. Materese opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Councilman Thomas R. Augostini read the following Proclamation:

In Memory of Edward "Eddie" Kiluk

WHEREAS, Edward Kiluk, of Owego, was a loving partner to Jennifer Morris Hanford, brother to 5 younger siblings, Kathy Phillips, Michael Kiluk, Debra Westgate, Jennifer Giammarino, and Brian Kiluk, son of Edward and Florence Kiluk, and uncle of many nieces and nephews; and

WHEREAS, Edward was a graduate of Seton Catholic Central High School and Broome Community College; and

WHEREAS, Edward began his law enforcement career as a Johnson City Police Officer before becoming a New York State Trooper, serving for nearly 30 years and spending several weeks assigned at ground zero following the terrorist attacks on 9/11; and

WHEREAS, Edward was a vibrant member of the greater Binghamton community with his involvement in the Endicott Sons of Italy, his organization of charity events and food deliveries, and his frequent patronage of local establishments, making friends wherever he went; and



WHEREAS, Edward held a strong love and loyalty for his New York Yankees and LA Raiders and enjoyed his time spent out on the golf course; and

Now, Therefore, the Town of Union Board celebrates the life of Eddie and the legacy of generosity and kindness that he has left behind for his loved ones.

Councilman Thomas R. Augostini said he recognizes a few of the names on Zoom, sisters and brothers of Eddie, and thanked the family and friends of Eddie Kulik for attending tonight's meeting. He said the Town of Union would like to recognize and celebrate Eddie's public service career to our community and his dedication to his career and family. He also said as a side note, he would run into Eddie at different events and thinks the reason he was at them, was to pick up food and treats to deliver to certain people he knew. He said you would see him at the Sons of Italy picking up dinners and delivering them at Willow Point Nursing Home to his friends who are residents there. He further said, Eddie had a big heart and will be a big loss to his family, friends and to the community. His life was transformed after 9/11. The Town wants to thank everyone for attending tonight and to thank Eddie for everything he did for his community over the 60 short years of his life.

George Phillips, former Broome County Legislator, thanked the Town Board for the beautiful honor to Ed Kulik. He said his service to his community was outstanding, but his death related to the cancer he contracted from the 9/11 cleanup, is also the reason we are honoring him tonight. He thanked Mayor Deemie as well for the proclamation that is coming from the Village of Johnson City and said honors from New York State will be forthcoming for this hero who gave his life, as many others did on 9/11/2001, although, 20 years later. He said Mr. Kulik was a proud native son of Johnson City and a proud State policeman with many years of service. He said the proclamation summarized Ed's life so well. He was full of wit and humor, loved his family and friends, and took care of his elderly parents. He went on to say that it has been so very hard to have this loss 20 years after 9/11, knowing that there were so many law enforcement officers that were lost on that day. Eddie was one of those that was a part of the vital and painful recovery effort. He can't imagine what Eddie faced as a State trooper, not only while defending us from criminals, but at times of accidents and tragedies. such as 9/11. He said many of you have been down to the 9/11 Memorial and the new Freedom Tower and have seen the names of those lost on that day. Ed's name may never be on that memorial with the other victims that died that day, but he was part of the healing that came forth from the nation that's going to be there forever. His legacy lives on in this community but he will also be a special part of this incredible day of heroism in United States history. Mr. Phillips thanked the Town again for this honor.

Supervisor Richard A. Materese said the service that we give pales in comparison to the sacrifices that he and his family have made. We are thankful and grateful to him and wish our condolences to the family.

HEARING OF VISITORS:

Village of Johnson City Mayor Greg Deemie said he would be happy to help the Town spend the stimulus money. He said he saw on the agenda the two Resolutions terminating the Code Department and the Planning Department services for Johnson City and asked what lead to these decisions. He further said that he would work with the Town to transition these departments back to the Village.

Supervisor Richard A. Materese said, as he explained to Mayor Deemie on the phone, that with the Town losing Deputy Commissioner of Public Works for Codes & Ordinances Daria Golazeski and two other Code Enforcement Officers, it would not be beneficial to the Town to hire people to basically only cover Johnson City code. He also said that he heard the statement "If we are not doing code, we should not be doing planning either, since they go hand and hand." Therefore, that is where the decision has come from.

Village of Johnson City Mayor Greg Deemie said he understands the reasoning and will work together on the transition.

Councilman Thomas R. Augostini said there were a lot of discussions with DCPW for Codes Daria Golazeski, Planning Director Sara Zubalsky-Peer and Senior Planner Marina Lane about the impending retirements and changes in staff and that's what drove us to the decisions. He said in 2011 -2012 when the agreements came into place, Daria Golazeski was the biggest component to the agreement. He also said that after listening to the staff and with the retirements happening, now is the right time to make this decision going forward. He said he is not sure it would work well at this standpoint for the Village.

Mayor Deemie said they have worked well with everyone and he has had no problems. He thanked the Town for their services.

Councilman Thomas R. Augostini said a major component of the agreement, Daria Golazeski, will be a hard role to fill. He said with the code enforcement history and knowledge of the Village, Dee is on the "Mount Rushmore of Knowledge" of people from Johnson City, and the loss of her is the big reason of this change. He said "it started with Dee and will end with Dee."

Mayor Deemie again acknowledged that things have worked well and will continue to work well with the Town, and they will work together to make this transition an easy process.

Village of Endicott Mayor Linda Jackson gave an overview of the stimulus spending discussion at the Village. She said there is a long list of streets that the engineer has to be done, but many of the streets have electric or water work to be done before paving them. She said there is a wish list for every budget. She went on to say that the Village of Endicott has to match the funding from the Greater Binghamton Fund for the Washington Avenue project. She said they approved Bond money to do this, but if the stimulus money comes in, they may



be able to use it instead for this project. She said the budget in the Village is done and the taxes are not going up very much, so hopefully the money will come in to do these wish list items.

George Phillips, as a taxpayer and current member of the Claim New York group, commended the Town on their solid budgets and on establishing the budgets. He also thanked the Clerk's office for their great transparency He said the roads are great in his neighborhood and throughout the Town. He thanked the Town for letting him speak.

As no one else wished to speak, Supervisor Richard A. Materese closed the first Hearing of Visitors.

Councilman Frank J. Bertoni said it is not just for the park rangers but it's whenever we try to pay someone, we have to look at their responsibilities, how many people they oversee, what kind of danger there is and that kind of thing; and I don't believe we have done this.
