TOWN OF UNION BOARD MEETING

June 21, 2023

The Regular Meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Union was held on Wednesday, June 21, 2023 at 7:00 P.M. in the Town Board Room, 3111 East Main Street, Endwell, New York.

BOARD MEMBERS PRESENT: Supervisor Robert Mack, Councilman Thomas R. Augostini, Councilman Frank J. Bertoni, Councilman Joseph P. Nirchi, Sr., Councilman David Kudgus.

TOWN OFFICIALS PRESENT: Town Attorney Alan J. Pope, Deputy Town Attorney Rosemarie Pope, Town Clerk Leonard J. Perfetti, Deputy Town Clerk Rebecca Kruczkowski.

Also in attendance was Village of Endicott Mayor Linda Jackson.

Supervisor Robert Mack opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Moved by Augostini, seconded by Bertoni to approve the Minutes of the Regular Town of Union Board Meeting held on Wednesday, June 7, 2023.

HEARING OF VISITORS:

Greg Shepherd, 240 Hillside Terrace, Endwell, Chairman for the Church of the Holy Family Bazaar to be held on July 14 – 16, 2023, said as the new Chairman, he is trying to pick up the planning process that was left when the previous chairman passed away. He is asking to have Special Event No Parking signs and barricades for street closures like what was requested prior to COVID in 2019. He gave a copy of the request letter to the Board.

Councilman Thomas R. Augostini said he will add this request to the Actions for this evening.



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Bob Otter, Airport Road, Binghamton spoke about the corporate park proposed by the IDA. He said the IDA has not submitted any SEQRE or any other forms in the Town of Maine or Union. He said he asked questions at the IDA meeting yesterday regarding how much money was spent so far and Stacey Duncan said about \$100,000.00. He said she said it was \$150,000.00 at the Town of Maine meeting. He asked her where the \$50,000.00 went and Ms. Duncan refused to answer any further questions. Mr. Otter said the Town of Maine will fight this and wants to send a letter saying so, but they do not have any information from the IDA on the project; and yet he said they are talking about eminent domain. He said they have not even notified the residents involved with the eminent domain, which he said it is not legal. He alluded to an email that he said Mr. Mack sent to an undisclosed person regarding the eminent domain, but would not produce it.

Town Attorney Alan J. Pope said if the IDA is not in the position to start anything with eminent domain, they do not need to say anything to the people.

Mr. Otter said the residents do not want this and he is asking the Town to look into this to see if this is a good thing for the Town residents.

Councilman Thomas R. Augostini said to Mr. Otter that he should not hold anything over anyone's heads like that and if you have information, you need to share it.

Supervisor Robert Mack said he does not appreciate accusations against him saying he knows something that is more than what the public knows and he wants to see the email. He said any information he gave to anyone came directly from Stacey Duncan.

Councilman Joseph P. Nirchi, Sr. said he was in the room and heard the same thing Supervisor Mack heard.

As no one else wished to speak, Supervisor Robert Mack closed the first Hearing of Visitors.

HEARING OF VISITORS:

Gary Robins, 32 Frederick Street, Johnson City, asked if the Town owned vacant lot at 19 Frederick Street could be fenced in with a chain link fence to allow the neighbors to use for a dog play area. He said the neighbors are willing to take care of the lot.

Town Attorney Alan J. Pope said FEMA has restrictions regarding the use of chain link fences on flooded properties because they collect debris that could cause water backup. He said there are some break away fences that might be able to be used.

Councilman Frank J. Bertoni said the dog park on Airport Road was started by a group of people who made up a committee and set up rules to follow. The Town set up a bank account for money that was collected for improvements. He suggested Mr. Robins get together with that group to see how they established the park and maintain it.

Town Attorney Alan J. Pope said to get a letter from the neighbors to say what they want and what they will be willing to do at it.

Councilman Thomas R. Augostini said for them to make sure FEMA would allow it. We cannot officially designate it as a park.

Councilman Frank J. Bertoni said FEMA Properties can never be built on, but properties that the Town bought from FEMA can be developed.

Robert Brady, O.L. Davis Fire Station, gave an overview of their Chicken BBQ on the 4th of July at Highland Park and reminded everyone that the Annual Ice Cream Social will be on Wednesday, June 12, 2023, and thanked everyone to attend.

As no one else wished to speak, Supervisor Mack closed the second Hearing of Visitors.

He ran the race in 21 seconds and is the fastest person that he has ever seen. Councilman Augustini also congratulated Evan Falvey, a student from Johnson City High School, and Destiny Ayers, a student from Maine Endwell, for receiving the Annual Red Cross Awards for rescuing a 7th grader at Highland Park last year from drowning. He said these were well deserved awards.

He went on to say that he had the privilege of plating in the Make a Wish Golf Tournament and recognized the local Town of Union businesses who made monetary donations – Nelcorp Electric, E & T Metals, Southern Tier Insulation, Lupos and Food & Fire. He said the County is very fortunate to have 6 Carousels.

Robert Brady, O.L. Davis Fire Station, said the chicken barbeque will start at Noon and will continue until sold out.
